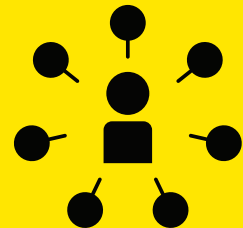

The Northern Territory Government has a comprehensive plan to break the cycle of youth crime and anti-social behaviour in Alice Springs.



Expanded hours of youth drop-in centres

The two youth drop-in centres at Gap Youth and Community Centre and Tangentyere Council Brown Street will be expanded to seven days a week.



Expanded hours of Tangentyere Night Patrol

The Tangentyere Night Patrol helps get young people off the streets. It will be expanded seven days a week from 6pm-3am.



Seven Youth Engagement Night Officers

Seven Youth Engagement Night Officers (YENOs) will be appointed to engage young people identified as being regularly involved in crime. They will operate seven days a week from 8pm-3am.



Two School Engagement Officers

Two School Engagement Officers will be appointed to work with young people who have been identified as being disengaged from education.



Three School Compliance Officers

Three School Compliance Officers will be appointed to work with young people when attempts to increase school attendance has not been successful.



More mobile CCTV cameras

Mobile CCTV cameras will be placed in anti-social behaviour hotspots. They allow police to rapidly deploy an overt surveillance capability that can be monitored live to assist in detecting incidents and identifying and prosecuting offenders.



Aboriginal Youth Outreach Service

A team of senior, respected Aboriginal outreach workers will provide advice and support to YENOs and mentor Aboriginal youth.
